What a challenge this past year has been! We have all experienced the strain of separation from family, friends and colleagues. For some, COVID-19 has caused significant deprivations from the basic necessities of life: food, shelter, health care and social interaction. NSCR has worked hard to make sure that our most vulnerable members of the community – seniors, young families, those with housing challenges and lower income – have access to the material, emotional and navigation support to maintain their wellbeing as much as possible.

One upside of the pandemic has been an increase in our volunteer base, especially younger people. One volunteer shared: "I was having a difficult and busy week at work and was thinking adding volunteering to my "list" of things to do was a bit much. I did a grocery shop for W. and it was exactly what I needed. She was so appreciative and we had a wonderful talk ... I realize that volunteering is more for me than the people I'm doing it for. It slows me down and makes me realize I have so much to be grateful for every day." We are grateful to you and the many volunteers, staff, donors, funders and community partners that support our work. We can't wait to move forward together!

On a personal note, it has been my honour to serve as President of NSCR for the past half decade. I have now passed the torch to Violet Jessen, a professor at Capilano University and long serving NSCR Board

member.

Serving the North Shore During the Pandemic

"If it wasn't for Mary and being able to talk to her, I don't know what I would do. It helps—you don't feel so isolated."

I was driving my four year-old to pre-school when the pandemic was announced on the radio. Many orders soon followed. Schools closed, businesses boarded their windows, people worked from home, masks became every day attire. We found our bubbles, we baked bread and we waited.

Returning to my job following my parental leave, I re-entered a very different work world. In some ways, it felt like starting a new job. There were practical challenges, like learning to Zoom and how to work from home with a sink full of dirty dishes. But there was something else I noticed. NSCR's staff team was closer than ever. There were some new faces since I'd left, but everyone working at NSCR during the first months of the pandemic had formed strong relationships. Due to the pandemic, my co-workers understood that they had to work harder than ever to reach and stay connected to our clients and the community.



Our staff worked together to respond to COVID challenges in remarkable ways. The Seniors' Caregiver Support program offered adapted programs to caregivers that provided education, support and referrals when many home care and respite services were cancelled. Our Better at Home program staff and volunteers provided

phone check-ins, food deliveries and transportation to isolated and vulnerable seniors. We currently provide services to over 1,000 seniors on the North Shore supported by more than 200 volunteers. NSCR's Seniors One Stop program connected with more than 2,000 people. For North Shore seniors, being able to speak with someone on the phone to navigate the complex, stressful pandemic world has been invaluable.

NSCR's Child & Parent team recognized that parents were isolated and service providers were on the frontlines, providing child care even when they were at risk of catching or spreading the virus. The team at NSCR pulled together, using creativity and teamwork to reach people

who were caring for children. Our staff held virtual story and song groups for parents, allowing them to connect with other families and children. Workshops for early childhood educators were moved online allowing more people to participate than prior to the pandemic. Staff virtually supported 1,146 parents to apply



for the Affordable Child Care Benefit. We assisted 6,000+ families who needed to find childcare. The team moved their Toy Lending Library online and provided curbside delivery to provide free access to new activities that could be enjoyed at home. These services helped our community feel less alone, more connected and better equipped to care for the children in their care.

I could say much more about our incredible staff and volunteers and how they've supported one another, and our community, during the pandemic. I haven't mentioned our front-of-office staff who gently greet our clients and help them find support, or our legal and housing advocates who tirelessly work to assist those struggling with basic living needs. Nor have I mentioned our managers who take care of our staff nor our dedicated volunteers who go above and beyond the call of duty every day. While I was reading books and baking with my children, my coworkers were not only managing the stress of serving our community in a pandemic, they were figuring out new, innovative ways to care for our community. The strength and resiliency they demonstrate is inspiring, and I am comforted knowing NSCR is there to help the North Shore move forward together.

Enhancing the Well-Being of Seniors and Caregivers

Seniors who maintain strong social connections continue to thrive as they age. NSCR offers a variety of programs that provide opportunities to maintain and increase their social connections, participate in the community and empower them to live their lives to the fullest.

North Shore Caregiver Support aims to support individuals caring for others, often seniors themselves, so the caregiver can maintain their own resilience, health and well-being. During the pandemic, we offered adapted programs of education, support, encouragement and referral to help support our clients.

North Shore Better at Home, funded by the United Way, supports seniors by providing them with seven basic non-medical services aimed at helping them maintain their independence with remaining in their own homes. The result is better health outcomes and happier older adults. With advent of COVID-19 this program was part of the "Safe Seniors Strong Communities" provincial initiative to assist seniors across the province. NSCR was the community Hub for the North Shore, connecting isolated and vulnerable seniors to needs of food, transportation and social connection via a multi-generational host of volunteers. During the year, we launched a satellite program on Bowen Island.









North Shore Seniors One Stop supports the independence, dignity and health of North Shore seniors by providing community navigation including one-to-one consultation for more complex needs. We publish an annual North Shore Seniors Directory, a detailed guide to all kinds of services and supports for seniors. This program was instrumental in helping seniors navigate the complexities and stressors during COVID-19.

Nurturing Intergenerational Learning

Research demonstrates that relationships and activities involving people of varied age groups is deeply enriching to the lives of all. Given NSCR's mandate to enhance wellbeing and with a large contingent of community partners, our Intergenerational North Shore program, (InterGen NS) has embarked on an effort to increase the knowledge

of the benefits of intergenerational activities while identifying and enhancing opportunities for North Shore residents to engage with more older and younger generations. Creating a steering committee and partnering with a Simon Fraser University research team, InterGen NS is working to deepen and disseminate our understanding of intergenerational resources and activities.



Securing funding from a variety of sources, we have surveyed community organizations and undertaken research to identify best practices in this emerging field. We look forward to hiring an InterGen NS Coordinator to lead our continued efforts in this coming year.



Promoting Democratic Participation

North Shore Democracy Café is a non-partisan program that encourages residents and citizens to more actively participate in civic life while encouraging governments to be more responsive to citizens' desires and needs. Our second cohort of the North Shore Young Citizens' Forum this year assisted younger adults aged 19–39 to learn about and better influence local governments.







